

Four parts of the epistemology course


- I = The nature of knowledge: What is knowledge?





- •e.g. 'one', 'blue', 'God', 'dog', 'happiness'...



Propositions


Sentences

A proposition is...

 A sentence in which two or more concepts are somehow linked

- What are the concepts here?
 - "Penguins are birds"





- •A proposition is, as a rule of thumb, any sentence that can be preceded with
- 'It is true that...'
- Or 'I believe that...'

Assertion

Claim

An **assertion** is proposition that is

stated as true

but not supported by a reason

To assert...

- 'Hollie will make an excellent PM'
- 'We cannot know anything for certain'
- 'It is always wrong to kill'
- 'God is real.'
- So, what is an assertion?

To claim...

•Another word for an assertion is a 'claim'
